The Recovery of NHS Hospital Treatment Following Road Traffic Accidents: Increasing the Level of Charges

I am writing on behalf of the Association of Personal Injury Lawyers (APIL) in response to the Department of Health's consultation on the above. APIL supports fully the principles underpinning the Road Traffic (NHS Charges) Act 1999. If that Act is to be meaningful, the charges levied by the NHS must reflect, as closely as possible, the actual costs of treatment provided. For this reason, we agree with the Department that:

- The NHS should be able to recover its costs at current prices and that, therefore, the tariff of charges should rise in line with Hospital and Community Health Service (HCHS) inflation;
- The ceiling of charges in any one case should rise from its current rate of £10,000 to enable the NHS to recover the majority of its costs;

• Once the above increases have taken place, they should be revised annually on 1 April in line with rises in HCHS inflation.
